

Patrick Henry Pearse (Pádraig Anraí Mac Piarais) was



born in Dublin on November 10, 1879. He developed a passion for the Irish language and tradition at a very young age and earned a degree in Arts and Law. He joined the Gaelic League in 1895 and founded St. Enda's School, a bilingual secondary school for boys, in 1908. Pearse was a published poet, playwright and political

essayist. His fervent commitment to the preservation of Ireland's culture and identity eventually turned political and he joined the Irish Volunteers and Irish Republican Brotherhood. Pearse's speech given at the 1915 funeral of republican Jeremiah O'Donovan Rossa inspired many to join the independence movement. His powerful way with words influenced the writing of the Proclamation of the Irish Republic which declared Ireland's independence from the United Kingdom. Serving as President of the Provisional Government, Pearse read the Proclamation outside Dublin's GPO at 12:30 on Easter Monday, April 24, 1916. The first shots were fired less than an hour later. After 6 days of destruction and bloodshed, he signed the unconditional surrender document which was delivered to all outposts. Pearse was the first to be executed for his role in the Easter Rising. In his final letter to his mother, he wrote, "We have preserved Ireland's honour and our own. Our deeds of last week are the most splendid in Ireland's history." He was shot at Kilmainham Gaol on May 3, 1916 at the age of 36.

EASTER RISING COMMEMORATION EXHIBIT April 10-17, 2016 at Edgerton Center Gallery Sacred Heart University

The Easter Rising in Dublin in 1916 was an armed rebellion by Irish republicans to end British rule in Ireland and establish an independent Irish state. For the Irish people, it stands as one of the most important events in twentieth-century Irish history. Commemorating the centennial anniversary of the Easter Rising, the exhibit recounts the events of the Rising as they occurred day by day.

The exhibit consists of sixteen (6'x 3') panels that tell the story of the Easter Rising, including its historical context, the day-by-day events of Easter week and profiles of the sixteen executed rebellion leaders.



J-I VISA PROGRAM

For a number of years the J-I Visa Program has allowed full time foreign students, who, for lack of financial resources, could not otherwise afford to come to the United States, to come under a cultural exchange program. This program allows the students to come to the US, find a job in an approved industry and support themselves. Over the last 50 years, more than 150,000 Irish students, including 8,000 in 2014 have benefitted from this program. This cultural exchange benefits both the Irish community in Ireland as well as the Irish American community in the US by maintaining our cultural ties and common values.

The J-I Visa Program has changed for 2016 and for the first time the applicants for this exchange program must have a job offer before they can apply for participation in this cultural exchange program. This has created a significant problem since you cannot change 50 year old program without causing a great deal of administrative and logistical problems. This new requirement is expected to reduce the Irish student participation to 4,000, half of the number in 2014.

There is significant effort being put forth by the Irish government as well as the Irish Consulate to address this problem and hopefully modify the requirements. In the meantime, these efforts will not help for 2016 and a committee of GAC members is organizing an effort to identify potential employers and lodging for a number of these students. We are asking the members if (1) you could find a summer job for an Irish student and (2) you would be willing to put up a student for the summer. There are specific restrictions on the types of employment which are not appropriate, i.e. au pairs, life guards, construction.
