MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL

To renew, please go to www.gaconline.org and click the "Membership" Tab/Folder. You will see: First time Login!

- 2. Complete the form and you will be e-mailed an entry box to create your password.
- 3. Now Login with your e-mail address and password.
- 4. Click on "View Profile" at the top right corner, beside the Logout button. Please review your details and make any updates. Renew by choosing check processed electronically (free); credit card (processing fee applies); or mailed paper check.

THE CATHOLIC CHURCH AND THE 1916 RISING



The Genealogy and Language Groups will host the 14th Lecture in a Series on Irish History on February 7, at 2:00 p.m. in the Carolan Room. The lecture will be presented by Oliver P. Rafferty, S.J.,

Professor of History and Director of Irish Studies Programs, Boston College. Fr. Rafferty will examine the attitude of the Catholic Church during the 1916 Rising, the controversial statement by Count George Plunkett that the Pope had blessed the rising, which would have been unlikely and have infringed on the Holy See's policy of "absolute impartiality". In the days after the Rising the rebellion was condemned by individual priests and bishops. The Vatican pressured the Irish hierarchy to try to instill in the insurgents respect for the governing power. These and other issues will be explored in the course of the lecture.

100TH ANNIVERSARY EASTER RISING COMMITTEE

Up until the unveiling of the 100th Anniversary Easter Rising Committee's 1916 Rising Commemorative Monument on April 24th, Sceala will feature the bios of the Seven Signatories of the Proclamation



Joseph Plunkett (Seosamh Pluincéid) was born into an affluent Dublin family on November 21, 1887. He was devoted to Irish culture, helping es-The Irish tablish Theatre in Hardwick Street and serving as contributor turned editor of The Irish Review. Plunkett had a keen mind for military strategy and was largely responsible for the plan followed by the IRB

Military Council. His negotiations with Germany secured weapons for the insurrection but that shipment of arms was ultimately intercepted by the British on its way to Ireland. Battling tuberculosis for years, Plunkett underwent glandular surgery just days before the Rising. Nonetheless, he was present at the GPO Headquarters with a young Michael Collins serving as his right-hand man. On the night before his death, Plunkett was allowed to marry his fiancée Grace Gifford. The youngest signatory of the Proclamation, he was executed on May 4, 1916 at the age of 28 in Kilmainham Gaol.

J-I VISA PROGRAM

For a number of years the J-I Visa Program has allowed full time foreign students, who, for lack of financial resources, could not otherwise afford to come to the United States, to come under a cultural exchange program. This program allows the students to come to the US, find a job in an approved industry and support themselves. Over the last 50 years, more than 150,000 Irish students, including 8,000 in 2014 have benefitted from this program. This cultural exchange benefits both the Irish community in Ireland as well as the Irish American community in the US by maintaining our cultural ties and common values.

The J-I Visa Program has changed for 2016 and for the first time the applicants for this exchange program must have a job offer before they can apply for participation in this cultural exchange program. This has created a significant problem since you cannot change 50 year old program without causing a great deal of administrative and logistical problems. This new requirement is expected to reduce the Irish student participation to 4,000, half of the number in 2014.

There is significant effort being put forth by the Irish government as well as the Irish Consulate to address this problem and hopefully modify the requirements. In the meantime, these efforts will not help for 2016 and a committee of GAC members is organizing an effort to identify potential employers and lodging for a number of these students. We are asking the members if (1) you could find a summer job for an Irish student and (2) you would be willing to put up a student for the summer. There are specific restrictions on the types of employment which are not appropriate, i.e. au pairs, life guards, construction.
